What is the Office of Justice Programs?

- The Office of Justice Programs (OJP)
 provides grant funding, training,
 research, and statistics to the criminal
 justice community.
- OJP is one of three grant-making components of the Department of Justice along with the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS).

Fund – Invest diverse funding streams to accomplish goals.


Educate – Research, develop, and deliver what works.

Partner – Consult, connect, and convene.


THE SECOND CHANCE ACT

 The Second Chance Act (SCA) provides funding to funding to reduce recidivism and improve outcomes for youth and adults leaving detention and incarceration to return to their communities.



FY 2021 ADULT REENTRY EDUCATION, EMPLOYMENT, TREATMENT AND RECOVERY PROGRAM OVERVIEW

- Began in FY 2021 with \$20.4 million awarded to 23 grants to state local, and tribal entities
- The goal of grantees under Category 1 (Improving Correctional Education) is to improve the academic and vocational education programs available to offenders in prison and jails by:
 - Implementing or expanding educational and vocational programs for incarcerated adults that result in improved educational outcomes; and
 - Demonstrating increased collaboration between educational providers and corrections, community supervision providers, and other reentry stakeholders.





Technical Assistance Provider (TTA)

INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT



- In November 2021, President Biden signed the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to strengthen U.S. infrastructure in key areas such as green energy, roads, and transportation.
- The amended version of the bill included approximately \$1.2 trillion in spending
- The investment is expected to create an estimated 1.5 million jobs per year over the next 10 years.


