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Background: Outcomes-Based Contracting and Pay for Success

- Under the broader umbrella of performance-based strategies, outcomesbased contracting (OBC) describes a direct contract that links payment directly to outcomes.
- The "Pay for Success" (PFS) model is **one type** of outcomes-based contracting that shifts financial risk from a traditional funder to a new investor who provides up-front capital to scale a program to improve outcomes for a vulnerable population.
- In a PFS model, if an independent evaluation shows that the program achieved agreed-upon outcomes, the investment is repaid by the traditional funder. If not, the investor takes the loss.
